POOL A: JAPAN

Head coach: Naoya Okubo Captain: Yoshiaki Taian

Coach notes

- Naoya Okubo guided a Japan XV team to the World Rugby Pacific Challenge 2024 title in April with wins over Manuma Samoa (48-5), Fiji Warriors (45-43) and Tonga A (65-15) in Apia, Samoa.
- The development competition featured predominantly under-23 players but Japan elected to send largely their U20 squad in preparation for the U20 Trophy campaign.
- A former Japan international, he played 29 tests for the Brave Blossoms as a second row or flanker from 1996-2004. He played at Rugby World Cup 1999 and 2003.
- He played once for Japan in Scotland, in a 100-8 loss at McDiarmid Park in Perth in November 2004.
- Okubo also played for Japan at Rugby World Cup Sevens 2001 in Argentina.

Form in 2024

- Japan's U20 team played under the guise of Japan XV in the World Rugby Pacific Challenge in Samoa in April, using the key development tournament as preparation for their return to the World Rugby U20 Trophy 2024.
- They beat Manuma Samoa 48-5, Fiji Warriors 45-43 and Tonga A 65-15 to claim the title.
- Kenji Sato was the top try-scorer for Japan XV in the tournament with five, one more than Yoshitaka Yazuki who made his test debut for Japan against England on 22 June.

- Japan were involved in the first draw in U20 Trophy history, 20-20 against Zimbabwe in the 2010 pool stages. There has only been one stalemate since, Canada 18-18 Uruguay in 2014.
- Japan have reached the final in six of their seven U20 Trophy appearances, losing the first three before tasting victory in 2014, 2017 and 2018.
- They require 61 points to become the fourth team to score 1,000 points in U20 Trophy history after Uruguay (1,431), Canada (1,061) and Namibia (1,011).



• Only Uruguay (184), Namibia (139) and Canada (137) have scored more tries than Japan in U20 Trophy history.

Coach notes

- Kenny Murray took up his current role with Scottish Rugby as head of player transition, including coaching the U20s, in January 2022.
- Prior to taking up the new role created by the SRU's director of performance rugby, Jim Mallinder, Murray spent nearly nine years as an assistant coach (defence) with Glasgow Warriors
- Murray began his coaching journey as head coach of Cartha Queens Park where he won Scottish Rugby's Coach of the Year award in 2006 before moving onto Ayr RFC.
- He led Ayr to their first Premiership title and three Scottish Cup wins before joining Gregor Townsend's coaching staff at Glasgow.

Form in 2024

- Scotland finished bottom of the U20 Men's Six Nations with five defeats from five.
- They lost to Wales 37-29, France 29-14, England 30-17, Italy 47-14 and Ireland 36-0.
- Freddie Douglas was their top try and points scorer with three and 15.
- Scotland have only won one match in the last three editions of the U20 Six Nations, against Wales in 2023.

- A former second-row, Leavasa played 17 tests for Manu Samoa between 1993 and 2002 and played at Rugby World Cup 1995 in South Africa.
- He was assistant coach for Samoa at Rugby World Cup 2015 and has worked with the Samoa A and Manuma Samoa development teams.

- Played three matches in the Oceania Rugby U20s Challenge from 27 February to 6 March in North Harbour, New Zealand, against Moana Pasifika, Tonga and Fiji.
- The Tonga match doubled as the regional qualifier for the World Rugby U20 Trophy 2024.
- Samoa lost 27-20 to the Junior Moana Pasifika team in round one, before beating Tonga 40-10 and losing to 31-17 to champions Fiji.
